



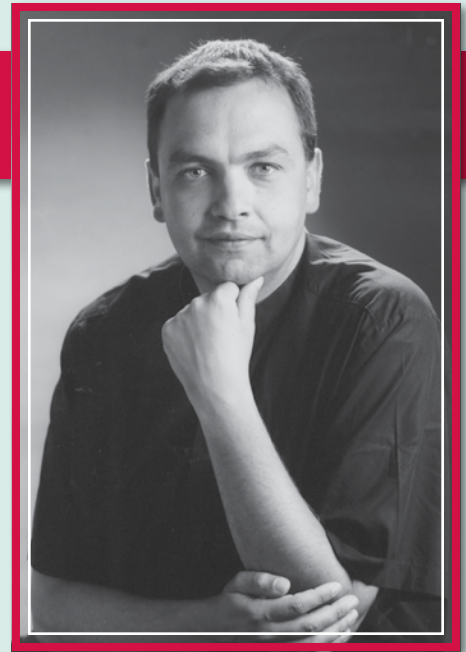

Christmas Letter by the General Praeses



“If you want to conquer evil, get to the bottom of it”
(Adolph Kolping)

Dear friends of Kolping throughout the world!

Joy and concerns have left their mark on the year 2009 which is drawing to a close. Twenty years ago, the citizens of Central and Eastern Europe were able to gain their freedom from Communism, for the most part by peaceful revolutions. In Europe, walls and fences as a means of terror are largely a thing of the past! Many people still feel the hard way towards democracy, which is nurtured by the freedom and the readiness of the citizens, to take on responsibility.

Moreover, the global financial crisis has led many people on other continents on the verge of their subsistence. Even if the governments of the rich countries try to lessen the effects of the crisis on their population with an incredibly high financial effort, the poor were hardest hit by actions which were not justifiable on an ethical basis.



In the past year, many Kolping sisters and Kolping brothers were able to experience directly that the worldwide intertwining of the economy and the globalization of the financial markets linked to it not only bring advantages. The temptation of separating capital and money from work, in order to bring about wealth by speculation, has been paid by the direct impoverishment of many and the encumbrance of generations which follow us. Greed and pride – two of the harshest sins – led people to sheer off of their life’s goal to be able to lead a decent life. More and more people doubt that our world is a just place, if the wealth of a few people is built on the poverty of the many! Neither Communism nor Liberalism turns the earth into a paradise for everyone! The entrance into paradises is limited to only a few people Bernhard Burger and the isolation of many from the riches of our earth continues unchecked!

An intensive global discussion also developed on the basics of human cohabitation. According to the words of Blessed Adolph Kolping: “If you want to conquer evil, get to the bottom of it” we find ourselves in a process of clarifying economic, political and ethic basics of our common good. Especially in this day and age when the usual thought patterns fail, we as Catholics may refer to the basics of our Social Doctrine with great confidence. Subsidiarity and solidarity as basic principles of a Christian way of thinking – derived from the Christian Image of Man – present themselves as a “Third Way”, i.e. as a way out of the crisis. This does neither absolutize a centralist control, nor the free flow of the market forces in all of life’s dimensions. Each person shall and has the obligation to care for himself as far as possible. This is especially true in the world of work and the family. Solidarity is only required, where it cannot be realized by the individual. Only then will higher instances intervene in a consulting and promoting way. As a Catholic Social Movement Kolping also demands the increased implementation of these principles in overcoming the crisis!

The year 2009 was able to distinguish itself as a year of Catholic Social Doctrine. By the publication of his Third Encyclical “Caritas in Veritate”, the Holy Father made a contribution to the societal discourse throughout the world, which deals with people, markets and morale.

Pope Benedict XVI tries to recall the philosophical and theological foundation of a just development of the entire human race by making clear references to the previous Social Teaching of the Catholic Church. Man has to be constantly reminded of who the Creation was about!

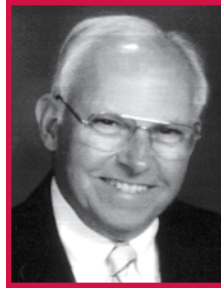

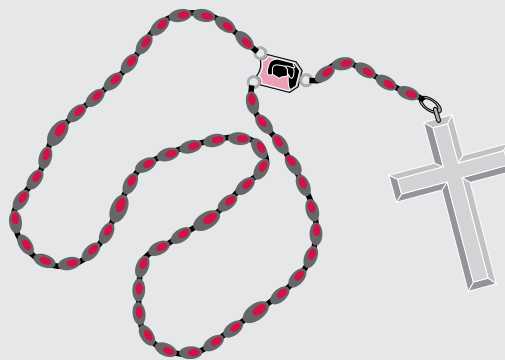

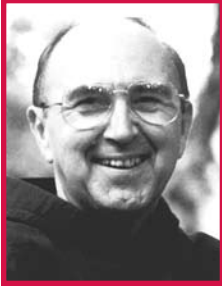
On behalf of the Officers and Trustees, I extend a Blessed Christmas wish to all and a Happy and Holy New Year.

A Praeses Proclaims . . .

In 1996, at our Convention in Chicago, Fr. Michel asked if someone would be willing to take the National position since he was feeling the pressure of a busy parish. At that time my schedule allowed me to take his place. It is now thirteen years later and I find myself in his position. At the last two conventions I asked for a replacement but there were no takers. So, I find myself in a very difficult position. At the next Convention I would like to step down from this position and I ask your help in finding a replacement. I can no longer simply ask. My work and my health are pressuring me to make this decision.

As a hospital chaplain I no longer have the freedom to determine my own schedule. I have a contract

that says I will be there at certain times. At the next Convention, even though it is in Cincinnati, I am going to be struggling to find some time when I can join you during that weekend. Even then I am expected to be at the hospital at times.

I do not believe in carrying a title if I cannot do the job. And I believe Kolping in the U.S. is in a critical time for various reasons. I have enjoyed my time in the national leadership even though these are difficult times. Both for personal reasons and for the good of the national organization I would like to see some new blood and new energy. The National Praeses can also be Praeses of a local Kolping Family or he can simply be National Praeses. Perhaps this is an early report which we usually prepare for the Convention. Because of tight budgets we have cut

many functions. We cannot survive for long by simply holding on to the status quo.

Because of distances and cost of travel, even the officers on the national level have little opportunity to get to know each other and spend time in planning or even in handling the business of Kolping. Lately we have met once or twice between Conventions. Telephone conference calls can only go so far. Computer e-mails are a poor substitute for spending time together in discussing and planning our future.

We are becoming more isolated in our local families and are losing the initiative for connecting on the national level.

I present these thoughts in the hope of stimulating some discussion before we come to the convention. As for myself, I will never lose my interest in Kolping, but as I come to my 73rd birthday I know I must make some changes and this is one of them. It is based on my own personal needs and I hope it is also for the good of Kolping in the U.S.

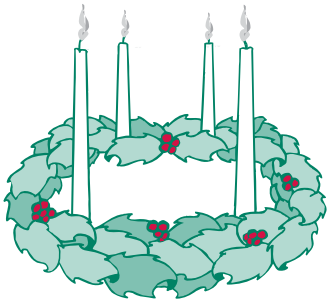

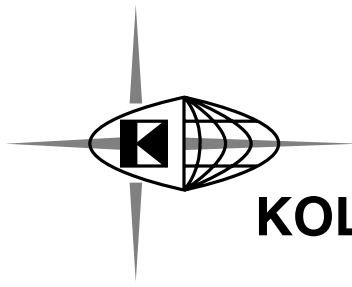

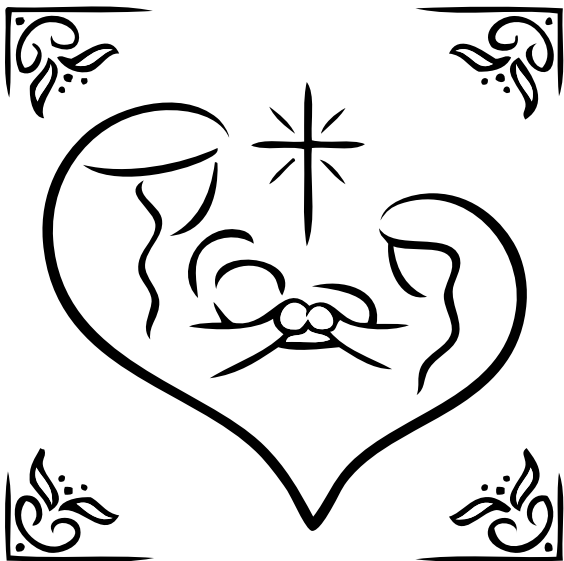

GERMANY**Yes to growing old**

“Yes to growing old”, this was the motto of a forum for senior citizens hosted by the Kolping Society of Germany from August 21-23, 2009 in Bad Honnef. More than 130 participants from all levels of the Association took part in this meeting and thus made it clear that for them the activation of the older generation is an important issue. Together they came to the conclusion that the society in Germany keeps growing older. While at the beginning of the last century, the average age was 45 years for men and 48 years for women, today it has grown to 78 and 83 years of age respectively, and the tendency is that it will continue to grow, as the age researcher Professor Ursula Lehr stressed. “We live in a society where people live longer” and this constitutes a challenge for all generations, for the problem of society is not the increase in the percentage of old people, but the decrease in the percentage of young people. Thus one third of the future old people do not have children, and half of them do not have grandchildren. Within the scope of the forum for senior citizens, discussions were held in 11 study groups on how the cooperation of the generations can be strengthened within the Kolping Families and how the older members are able to play a role in the shaping of the Church and society under the motto “Active after 50”.

GERMANY**Discover the needs of the time just like Fr. Kolping did**

“Discover the needs of the time just like Fr. Kolping did”, with these words Bishop Dr. Karl-Heinz Wiesemann encouraged the participants of the Diocesan Day of the Diocesan Kolping Society of Speyer, to face the current challenges of the time. More than 600 members had gathered for the concluding meeting of the Diocesan Day in Landstuhl, which had started already on August 21, 2009, with a youth tent camp and, on August 22, set the first stimuli with regard to content. In different study groups, the participants were dealing with the questions on the international solidarity, the problems of euthanasia and the prospects of the hospice movement, as well as



with the question as to how Kolping Families are to commit themselves today. Sunday started with a High Mass which was followed by a trade fair at which the different facilities of the Association were able to present themselves. The Diocesan Day ended on Sunday afternoon with a podium discussion between personalities from the Church, society, and the Kolping Society on the theme of the Diocesan Day: “Returning to the Source of life – Words become deeds”.

SWITZERLAND**Whosoever shows courage, generates courage**

“Whosoever shows courage, generates courage”, this is the central theme of the Kolping Path of Contemplation which was inaugurated on Saturday August 23, 2009. More than 800 members from Switzerland and neighbouring National Kolping Societies had followed the invitation and accompanied the Auxiliary Bishop H. G. Martin Gächter/Basel and General Praeses Msgr. Axel Werner as they blessed the individual Stations. The about 5 km (1.5 hrs) long Path of Contemplation leads from the parish church in Hochdorf through a beautiful countryside to the Institute Church in Baldegg. On the way, there are nine stations with information on Fr. Kolping and the Kolping Society, as well as words from the Bible to stimulate meditative reflections. In his sermon the General Praeses stressed that people are constantly searching for meaning and for places where they can find answers to their search for meaning. The Path of Contemplation is to be such a place and it is about probing the life of Fr. Kolping as a guideline for one’s own future.

BRAZIL**Showing Faith through deeds**

“Showing Faith through deeds” was the motto for the 7th state meeting of the Kolping Youth in Floriano in the State of Piauí, which took place from July 10 to 12, 2009. More than 60 youth leaders from the various Kolping Families, but also representatives of

the Kolping Society of Piauí and of politics took part in this meeting. The aim of this youth meeting was a revival of the youth work in the regional Kolping Society in view of the increasing challenges which youths are facing today, such as access to the labour market, the lack of public schools, urban violence, the loss of family values, drugs and the lack of self-esteem among youths. Within the scope of the state meeting, various successful models were presented how the Kolping Youth has been able in different places to solve social problems and to give the youths more self-confidence by overcoming individualism and through the cooperation of the youths in groups. By forming groups, the Kolping Youth was also successful in getting invited for consultations by political parties and other structures in public life, to search for solutions to the problems of the youths. Furthermore, the Kolping Youth has also committed itself strongly in the area of the youth pastoral care and has influenced and helped shape the cultural life in the villages.

The state meeting ended with a liturgical service, during which the youths symbolically put their work in the hands of God and manifested their willingness to continue to be active in the world as Christians.

COLOMBIA**Successful with entrepreneur’s seminars**

In 2008, the Kolping Society of Colombia – in cooperation with the national organization SENA – prepared more than 420 people in entrepreneur’s seminars for establishing their own small businesses. The aim of these seminars is to discover existing entrepreneurial capabilities and to develop them in order to create new jobs by means of establishing small businesses and thereby generate gainful employment for a larger number of people. In 2008, 23 preliminary cooperatives as well as two cooperatives were founded as a result of these seminars. In total 1,500 people are organized in these cooperative structures and thus directly involved in the economic activities.

Along with the training measures, the allocation of loans serves the promotion of economic activities of small businesses. The Kolping Society of Colombia was able to allocate such loans to 215 persons in 2008.

MEXICO**Expertise on Economía Solidaria is being asked for**

In his Encyclical “Caritas in Veritate”, Pope Benedict XVI pointed to the special importance of economies which are not predominantly characterized by the pursuit of profit, but rather by solidarity. In various Latin American countries, a system of Economía Solidaria (solidarity-based economy) is being stimulated and promoted with the support of the Catholic Church, which embraces these principles. The Kolping Society of Mexico has also joined this system and has by now gained a high reputation in this area. Thus the Managing Director, Rafael Jacobo, was invited to give a lecture in a committee of the national parliament reporting on the experiences and successes of this system. During his appearance, Rafael Jacobo could not only point to the many Kolping members who have joined this system at the producer’s level, but was also able to report on the successful efforts in selling the products at trade fairs or in the shops of the different Kolping facilities.

PARAGUAY**Kolping educational facility receives award**

The Vocational Training Centre of the Kolping Society of Paraguay in Fernando de la Mora received the Sapientiae award by the Organização das Américas para a Excelência Educativa (ODAE) (Organization of the Americas for Excellence in Education). This award is bestowed by the organization located in Brazil to the 100 best educational facilities. In the Kolping Society’s Vocational Training Centre in the metropolitan area of Asunción alone, around 2,000 students are trained per year, especially in metal-working occupations and in the field of car repair. At present, the necessary conditions are being created in the Vocational Training Centre to be able to also offer training in health care jobs in the future. More offers for vocational training would then be available to women.

PERU**Kolping opens ways into the world of work**

Making a contribution to fighting poverty is a core motivation in the work of the Kolping Society of Peru. Occupational qualification of people is a means to achieving this goal. In 2008

alone, the Kolping Vocational Training Centre in Tacna assisted more than 690 young people in getting a recognized occupational qualification. The same number of people profited from the 19 income-generating projects of the Kolping Society, i.e. the establishment of a fish farm, a rice mill, a tailor’s shop, and various similar projects. The growing successes and results in this specific project work also increased the attractiveness of the Kolping Society Peru. In the meantime, the Association has therefore grown to 80 Kolping Families with more than 1,300 members.

INDIA**Kolping Society supports the construction of more than 4,000 houses for families**

In 1993, the Kolping Society of India started its housing programme and in mid-2009 it was able to establish that during this time more than 4,000 houses were built for Kolping members within the scope of this programme. For this housing programme, the members have to prove that they have savings and own a plot of land before they get to enjoy the subsidies of the Kolping Society. Due to the Tsunami and other natural disasters, the time they needed to save the equity capital markedly increased in some regions, but by now all available means have been put into

use. The housing programme extends to all 30 dioceses in South India, in which the Kolping Society is present. Father Victor Santiago, who is the initiator of this housing programme, wrote in a report to the promoters of this programme: “I wish you could see the sparkling eyes of the people when they move into their new house. More than 4,000 Families now received a house and therefore more than 20,000 people have a decent place to live”.

VIETNAM**Growth of the Association continues**

The growth of the Kolping Society continues, in spite of the difficult climate. On May 21, 2009, nine Kolping Families were founded and 224 members admitted into the Association in the diocese of Hung Hoa during a High Mass. How much the establishment of these new Kolping Families – and therefore the development of the Kolping Society in the diocese – are supported by the diocesan administration, became evident by the fact that the Diocesan Bishop and sixteen priests took part in the celebrations. On the whole, the members of the Kolping Society of Vietnam are also affected to a high degree by the economic crisis which is also very noticeable in Vietnam, and the struggle for the economic basics of everyday life has a restrictive effect on the life of the Association as well.
