EYE WITNESS TO THE RESURRECTION

I can't believe how fast I ran that day when the women that would often accompany our group told us that the tomb in which we laid our dear Rabbi was empty. I ran so fast that I outran our leader, our head apostle, Peter. However, out of respect for him. I waited outside the tomb until he arrived. We both went in and looked. We saw the burial cloths neatly placed on the side, but there was no body of our dearly beloved Rabbi. Jesus was missing, and I knew. 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

We welcomed 55 adults, six children (and one Kolping infant!) to our General Meeting way back on Sunday June 25th, 2017. We also learned about the homeless problem in Kolping's own neighborhood and the services provided to those in need-like a hot lunch, a warm place to spend a few hours with other people, and an opportunity to shower and wash their clothing. We were very proud to present Deacon John with the food, socks and underwear our

members donated. Some members donated cash and the Society added to it, for a total cash donation of \$655. Deacon John expressed his thanks and asked us to keep up the good work for a good cause.

We also took some time to pay tribute to three Brooklyn members who reached 50 years of membership in 2017: **Arlene Heller, Margarete Knapp** and **Arnold Ruf**. Despite the fact that none were with us that day they are well remembered and we enjoyed anecdotes and reminisced about each of them. We finished the meeting up with little Crazy Hat contest just for fun and modest prizes were awarded.

Father Chris Heanue was able to join us for our **Kolping Mass** and **All Souls Day Observance**, on October 21. We were at a disadvantage as it turned out a number of our 'regulars' were involved at an event at a nearby parish that very evening. In the end we wound up with 35 dinner guests. Special mention goes to our own Inge Jellen-she alone brought fourteen people which was a stupendous effort! Father Chris was inspirational as always. He enjoyed dinner with us and opened our program before he had to leave. Our talk focused on the Kolping Society of Berundi and the history and significance of All Souls Day. Our guests were generous and remembered to bring food items for our deserving charity project. It is always nice to see our Kolping Center turned into a chapel and used for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and our members' participation.

The Kolping Family Christmas Party was held Saturday, December 9. The day before the event we had 70 reservations. Then the snow started to fall and we wound up with 53 adults and 16 children. Germany

A high speed train called "Adolph Kolping"

In mid-September, the German Railways issued a name search for the new ICEgeneration – the ICE 4. As name-donors, Ger-man historical celebrities from the fields of culture, politics, science, business, and sports were searched for. Among more than 2,500 name suggestions, Adolph Kolping made it into the top 25. Thus a train will be given his name already in 2018/2019.

In addition, the jury chose another 75 names, which will be given to more express trains by 2023. Commenting on the deci-sion announced on October 27, 2017, National Secretary Ulrich Vollmer said: "We are extremely pleased that so many peo-ple voted for the name of Adolph Kolping. This expresses the great esteem that our founder, the priest and social reformer Adolph Kolping still experiences today in the Church and in society."

Germany Training for volunteer leaders

The annual course 2017, the central advanced training for volunteer leaders in the Diocesan and State Kolping Societies, has been successfully completed. Ten participants dealt in four modules with Kolping Germany and its focal points, the Catholic Social Teachings, the financial and legal framework conditions, as well as with issues of public relations and communication. They received the certificates of participation in Frankfurt in mid-September. Along with the main topics, the exchange on projects and experiences, as well as networking was given a lot of attention.

Germany Living partnership

In the St. Georg district of Hamburg, the Kolping Youth Living Quarters were officially opened together with the new integra-tion and family centre. The building complex also includes the "Schorsch" (House of the St. Georg Youth) and the Aids Pasto-ral. Josef Holtkotte, National Praeses of Kolping Germany, blessed the new premises and apartments of the 46 residents of the Kolping Youth Living Quarters. For the Hamburg Archdiocese, Archbishop Dr. Stefan Heße gave a greeting address.

Austria

Commitment to mothers and students - demonstrably successful

Two excellent reports can be passed

on from Kolping Austria. Firstly, for over 30 years, Kolping "Mother & Child Facilities" (MUKIs) have provided women in difficult social situations shelter and care for themselves and their children, as well as sup-port on their way to a settled life. They often had to flee from violent relationships, and some are actually threatened by pov-erty and homelessness. Over the past few months, the "Competence Centre for Non-Profit Organizations and Social Entrepre-neurship" of the Vienna University for Economics and Business has investigated the impact and social "added value" of Kolping Austria's two MUKIs as part of a "Social Return on Investment" (SROI) study. The result of this analysis was pre-sented at the end of October, whereby the authors of the study (leader Dr. Christian Schober, project assistants: Flavia-Elvira Bogorin BA, Mag.a Olivia Rauscher and Verena Burger) confirmed the success and efficiency of the Kolping work in the exam-ined area: every Euro invested in the MUKIs generates more than five times the social benefit, and the groups that benefit the most are those for whom the project was devised and implemented - the mothers and their children.

Success also continues in another

area: for students in Meidling. In the presence of many Kolping people from all over Aus-tria, the Kolping House was officially reopened for students in Vienna-Meidling after a complete renovation. As when it was founded nearly one hundred years ago, it will once again offer young people aged 18 and over a "temporary home" during their education/training. With over 3.200 square meters with bright, friendly living spaces, spacious communal areas, balco-nies and roof terraces offering attractive views, as well as larger areas for events and festivities, there is something for every-one in the new Kolping House Meidling. In addition to the roughly 70 youth residences, accommodation was also created for families seeking

asylum in Austria. "Today we return to our core competence: to accompany young people on their way into the future," said Christine Leopold, President of Kolping Austria, in her dedication speech and referred to the multi-functional character of the new Kolping House: "The commitment of our Association to education, affordable housing, and integration are coming together here."

India Holiday camp for children from poor families

Everywhere in the world, parents are faced with the question of what to do with their children during school holidays, if they, themselves, have to work. This year, Kolping India has been able for the first time to offer holiday camps for children from poorer families. Normally, only children from wealthy families meet at the popular holiday camps. But Kolping India offered holiday activities specifically for families in remote and mountainous regions such as Kennathady and the Udhagamandalam region, where many people have to work hard every day to feed their families. Many of the children have had a picnic for the first time in their lives. In addition, the 10-day holiday camps offered English courses, as well as computer training, and sew-ing workshops. An unforgettable time for the little ones in the Kolping Families.
