Romania: Euro orphans and a vital community

Thousands of Romanians are leaving their country every year, trying their luck in another European country. There is almost no chance to find a job and in many sectors wages are too low to feed a family and to make a Thousands of living. children are left behind to live with their grand-



parents, aunts and uncles or neighbours. In a documentary, German television reported on the great work Kolping Romania is doing for the so-called Euro orphans.

Every day about 45 children in Oituz in South-Western Romania get a warm meal after school plus lots of love and comfort. For, most of those children see their mom and dad only once a year and only for a short time.

Dr. Markus Demele, General Secretary of KOLPING INTERNATIONAL, visited Kolping Families in Romania in May this year and met some vital communities. "It is amazing to see all those dedicated people who work for Kolping Romania on a voluntary or full-time basis and who create such a dynamic atmosphere. Everyone is getting involved to make projects such as the Children's Center in Oituz or the training hotel in Brasov a reality", Mr. Demele said.

There are also some small-scale local initiatives where Kolping Families make things happen. "The Kolping Family Gheorgheni, for instance, organizes a regular charity bazaar and festivities to raise funds for the large number of people in need in their town. Every week the Kolping Family meets in a room of the parish house in Gheorgheni to plan new activities such as a soup kitchen, childcare programs or special classes for people who want to start a business. The enthusiasm of all those people was really contagious", Markus Demele noticed during his visit to Transylvania.

Mexico: Benefiting from education and training

The Kolping Vocational Training Center in Mexico City has become an established institution in the area. Kolping Mexico offers young people (and adults) an opportunity to receive a qualified training in gastronomy, or to become bakers, pastry chefs or nurses.

In addition, so-called soft skills are taught, which help young people to develop their potentials and their personalities further. If possible, parents are also included. The Training Center is located in a neighborhood that is increasingly marked by drug trafficking and crime. That is another reason why we try to strengthen the families of those young people by running special information evenings for parents. Some 925 people finished their training at the Kolping Center last year, improving their future prospects.

JOINING HANDS, WE PRAY

One of the things I find meaningful during our Chicago Kolping gatherings is when it comes time to sing The Kolping Song. One of our trusted leaders begins the first few notes and then leads us in the song that everyone sings with great pride.

What's particularly meaningful is the point in the song when we sing: "Joining hands, our brothers pray; and joining hands our sisters pray, Father Kolping God bless you!" That's when we cross our arms in front of us and then grab the hand of our brother and sister.

Joining hands, of course, is a great gesture that instantly communicates unity and peace—one of the things, incidentally, we pray for during every Mass right before we extend a sign of peace to one another, typically with a handshake. We do that in anticipation of receiving the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ.

So joining hands is a profound gesture that leads to communion. It's an outward sign of an interior disposition. Jesus urges us to love God with all our being and to love our neighbor as ourselves. And so the simplicity of a handshake, like a smile, communicates a deeper reality—there's a connection between people, a bond that comes from our connection with God.

In creating the Kolping Societies, Father Kolping desired to instill a feeling of belonging and friendship between people that is instilled to us through our faith. He wanted to find a way for strangers to become friends. He valued hospitality and welcoming others, because he also recognized that every individual has a need to contribute and participate in society and within families. Not only that, we all have a fundamental desire to express it, and one of the places we express it is in our family homes, because a home is a place we belong.

66 Joining hands, our brothers pray; and joining hands our sisters pray, Father Kolping God bless you! ??

Above all, the home is the place we learn how to love. So, when we reach out a hand, it's a sign of peace and welcome. It's also a gesture that says we are open to pulling people toward us, instead of using those same hands to push them away.

On May 19, 2018, I was proud to witness the Holy Spirit descend on the former Daniel Dengler in his ordination to priesthood, as Fr. Pier Giorgio Dengler!

In the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, in Washington D.C., Timothy Cardinal Dolan layed his hands upon Br. Pier Giorgio, along with 8 of his fellow ordinandi, and by the power of the Holy Spirit ordained them to the Sacred Order of Priest.

Announcement of an election

Regarding the by-election of a member of the International Executive Board of KOLPING INTERNATIONAL

Last year Thomas Dörflinger retired from his office as the National President of Kolping Germany. As a consequence, his mandate as a member of the International Executive Board will expire at the 2019 meeting of the International Board of Directors.

Article 45 of the International Constitution states: "If one of these five additional members of the International Executive Board loses the national office which determined his/her membership on the International Board of Directors, a by-election shall be held at the next meeting of the International Board of Directors. If a member of the International Executive Board resigns during his/her term of office, a by-election for the remainder of the term shall be held." In the same article it says: "Those five additional members shall include one member each from Africa, Asia, Europe, America and from the National Association with the highest number of members." The national association with the highest number of members is Kolping Germany.

Kolping Germany suggests Kolping brother and deputy National President of Kolping Germany, Mr. **Manuel Hörmeyer**, as a candidate.

Since the representation of regions on the International Executive Board is an optional provision there may also be other candidacies. According to the Election Rules, candidacies must be announced and submitted by national associations to the General Secretariat by July 12, 2019 at info@kolping.net

Peace Walk and Continental Convention

Europe elected a new parliament in May and Kolping Europe also had some major events such as the 52nd International Kolping Peace Walk in Vianden, Luxembourg. Many hikers became painfully aware of the importance of peace in Europe and that we cannot take it for granted. In view of the threatening election success of right-wing populists who wish to reduce political cooperation on the continent to a minimum, many participants were encouraged to show their colours for a peaceful Europe. The participants went on a hike together with the General Praeses of KOLPING INTERNATIONAL, Msgr. Ottmar Dillenburg and prayed for an alert Europe.

At the Continental Convention in Rome, delegates were also encouraged to be on the alert. In an educational part on Saturday morning, Prof. Riccardo Pozzi, OSCE (Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe) Special Representative of and advisor to the Chairperson-in-Office gave a presentation on the signing of the "Roman Treaties" in Rome in 1957.



Professor Pozzi welcomed Kolping Europe's Declaration entitled "We need Europe to be effective and strong!" It underlines that there is a need for people with values and ambition, hope and a political will. The principles of Catholic social teaching – human dignity, subsidiarity and solidarity – give an orientation for a sustainable European policy committed to the common good. The convention ended on Sunday with a joint visit of delegates to St. Peter's Square for the Angelus prayer with Pope Francis greeting the delegates of the Continental Convention warmly.
