From the President's Desk ...

I hope by the time you receive this article the world will be a little less terrifying and a bit more predictable. I have been thinking a lot about the humanitarian catastrophe in the Ukraine, how fragile peace is and how quickly life can take a turn. I know many of our older members have lived through harrowing experiences and know all too

well what it is like to have your life turned upside down. I feel fortunate to say "I cannot imagine what it would really be like." I am sad, yet grateful and somehow this feeling seemed to align with the Lenten season.

The word Lent is from an Old English term meaning springtime. Springtime usually conjures up pictures of new life, florescent green leaves, flowers and sunshine. For many it would seem odd that we begin our Lenten period using ashes as a symbol of penance, grief and mortality. We fast and abstain from things we otherwise love. We use these ashes to acknowledge "from dust we come and to dust we shall return."

But this acknowledgement can also be seen as a wake-up call. It's a time to reawaken our spirits to the gratitude we must hold on to for those things good in our lives. We can open our hearts to others less fortunate and generously share those things for which we can be grateful – our talents, finances, time and optimism. Lent is a time to sacrifice and offer that which we gave up/ sacrificed to someone or something that might need it more.

I found an article about how to make the Lenten period more meaningful, but in reading it thought some of the tips might be useful throughout the year:

- **Slow Down** Set aside 10 minutes a day for silent prayer or meditation. It will revitalize your body and your spirit.
- **Be kind** Go out of your way to do something nice for someone else if feels good.
- Reach out Make that phone call you've been thinking about the recipient will be glad to hear from you.
- Pray God only knows the world needs yours more than ever.
- **Tune out** Turn off the television and spend quality time talking with family members or friends.
- **Donate** clean out a closet, contribute financially, volunteer your time there are a lot of people in need.

I encourage you to consider participating in our Lenten Project and hope to see you at the Convention in Cincinnati!

It has been a while since we updated our fellow Kolping Families on what's been going on in Cincinnati, so there's no time like the present.

We started out the year of 2021 still cancelling events due to the pandemic, but as the year wore on and the COVID-19 vaccines were being rolled out, we began cautiously holding events and resuming activities.

We resumed our popular Fish Fries during Lent in February and March, but offered the service in drive-through mode only. We held our Awards Banquet in April after cancelling it in April of 2020, so members received their service anniversary awards for both 2020 and 2021 at this event. There were twentythree recipients of significant service anniversary certificates for 2020 and thirty-one for 2021. 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Kolping Help to Ukraine

While the terrible war in the Ukraine econtinues, numerous Kolping members in Europe are active in sending aid transports to the borders, picking up refugees there and accommodating them safely. It is unbelievable and admirable what is being organized across different Kolping levels - by KOLPING Ukraine itself, but also by the associations in the neighboring countries of Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Hungary as well as in Austria and Germany. We would like to thank everyone involved and all donors who make this emergency aid possible! The first refugees arrived in Romania the day before yesterday, the Kolping houses there have around 130 places ready. The Kolping houses in Poland are also reporting the first groups of refugees, and KOLPING Slovakia is also ready. The Kolping houses in the Ukraine itself – in Chernivtsi, Lviv, Uzhgorod and Shargorod – are sometimes even full. The situation on site is sometimes tense, and the residents have to seek shelter in the cellars again and again. KOLPING Ukraine coordinates accommodation and food for the new arrivals and ensures that the transport of aid supplies from neighboring countries finds its way. The first vans from Poland and Romania have already arrived, loaded with everything from warm clothing to medical equipment. Further transports are in preparation. Please continue to donate to our Ukraine aid so that we can support even more people together.
