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

organization. Yet, we are buoyed celebrating 150 years of Kolping in Chicago, enjoying the biggest Schutzenfest turnout yet in Cincinnati and "finally" having activities together, in person.

If we've taken any lesson away from these past "Covid" years, it is the importance of community and appreciating what each of us brings to the table. Interestingly enough, in our recent scholarship competition, applicants used one quote from Father Kolping more often than any other, namely, "Humans need to join forces with other humans as soon as they want something that simply exceeds the capacities of the individual."

As one applicant wrote: "Father Kolping understood most people want to feel like they are a contributing member in society and helping shape a fairer world. Father Kolping experienced this while helping workers wronged by industrialization with his help in spreading Journeyman's Society. In today's world, this is achieved through education, career, philanthropy, family and faith. Education aids in keeping Father Kolping's ideas alive by educating our youth to prepare them to become participating, mature members of society."

Another wrote: "Father Kolping seemed to promote the individual wealth and talents of a human and thought it was a good idea to bring those individual qualities and share them amongst a community to be a part of something even greater than oneself. This way everyone's strengths can come together, and individuals are encouraged, promoted, and supported by the community they have around them because of the genuine family aspect of a Kolping Family."

Finally, a third shared: "Compassion and empathy are two traits that define Father Kolping and his work to ensure that everyday people weren't forgotten in the drastic changes of societal industrialization. The "no man left behind" philosophy that guided Father Kolping is still extremely relevant in our world today. That relevance is so long lasting because no matter how much our world may change and grow, the core still remains the same. People will still need to be helped and there still needs to be people that provide the help. Understanding that no one has gone through life without the help of others is essential to grasping why Father Kolping's ideas are still so prevalent in our world".

I am grateful for these reminders from our scholarship applicants and hopeful that we, as a larger community, can forge ahead and continue the works and legacy of Father Kolping. I look forward to seeing many of you at the convention and encourage those who may not be able to attend to send us their thoughts and ideas on how to craft our future.

A Praeses Proclaims...

THE NEED FOR AUTHENTIC WITNESSES

A few years ago, a daughter of a permanent deacon told me that she had completely left the faith because she was tired of hearing her father preach against moral faults that he himself possessed. She could not separate the content of her father's words from the example of his own actions. He was condemning rather than leading. His hypocrisy gave him no credibility to speak about morality. He was trying to lead others in ways that he himself had not yet mastered

Hypocrisy is certainly a problem for anyone who tries to be an ethical teacher. A mother once asked Gandhi to tell her child to stop eating sugar. Gandhi told the mother to go home and to come back in two weeks. Though the mother was perplexed, she came back with her son two weeks later. This time, Gandhi said to the boy: "You should stop eating sugar. It is not good for your health." After the boy agreed, the woman asked Gandhi why he waited two weeks to chastise her son. He replied: "Mother, two weeks ago I was still eating sugar myself."

Like Gandhi, preachers of the Gospel of Christ have to guard against hypocrisy. Christ criticizes those who "tie up heavy burdens and lay them on men's shoulders, but they themselves are unwilling to move them with so much as a finger." (Mt 23:4) There is always the danger that a preacher will lay heavy burdens on the shoulders of his listeners without being willing to shoulder those burdens himself. The Church always needs more preachers that are authentic witnesses to Christian morality.

We must also remember, however, that most of us fail to achieve full moral consistency in this life. If we are honest and open about our own limitations, we can use that brokenness to help others.

In his great book "The Wounded Healer," Henri Nouwen writes about the vocation of an imperfect minister to direct others to God's healing message: "Making one's own wounds a source of healing, therefore, does not call for a sharing of superficial personal pains, but for a constant willingness to see one's own pain and suffering as rising from the depth of the human condition that we all share." I have tried to take Nouwen's words to heart during my own ministry of preaching. Most of my homilies are homilies that I need to hear myself.

Most of us who participate in Sunday Mass regularly know that we are imperfect, that we are sinners, that we are so often hypocritical. We do not attend Mass because we are perfect; we attend because we are imperfect. It is only God who can heal and perfect us. This is true of parishioners and preachers alike.

God the Father is searching for authentic witnesses, men and women who will give their word to love and serve Him, and in their weakness, will work to inspire others. Let each of us strive to be such witnesses.


This will give you the Kolping rate of \$169 per night.






