





# Myanmar: A visit that brings hope

The first ever visit of a KOLPING General Praeses to Myanmar has taken place recently. Ukraine: Visit to the land of those who are confident of victory

Gregor Federhen, our desk officer responsible for Central and Eastern Europe, has just returned from his trip to Ukraine. He visited primarily projects and the work with refugees in the town of Uzhhorod, near the Slovakian border, where a very active Kolping Family is providing humanitarian aid. Here he describes some of the impressions he had of the current situation in the country.
