A Praeses Proclaims...

MORE THAN JUST A DAY

“Alleluia!” “He is risen!” “This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad!”

The responses we sing and hear on Easter Sunday are too significant and meaningful to last just one day. In our Church, Easter is not just a one-day celebration. It takes us eight days to celebrate Easter Sunday in what we experience as the Easter Octave. And it takes an entire season—50 days—to dive into the mystery of Jesus’ Resurrection and what it means for us today.

What is prominent in our churches throughout the Easter Season is the Paschal Candle (or Easter Candle), which is placed either near the ambo or altar and lit throughout the 50 days. The US Bishops reflect on its significance: “The paschal candle is the symbol of ‘the light of Christ, rising in glory,’ scattering ‘the darkness of our hearts and minds.’”

That’s why it seems so fitting that it is located near the place where we hear the gospels. The light of Christ—which shines throughout the scriptures—is meant to stay lit and kept burning within our hearts. And to help us do that, the Church leads us through the Easter Season with a selection of gospel readings that move us from the empty tomb to the empty upper room, when the apostles—filled with the Holy Spirit—open the door and bring the good news (which is what “Gospel” means) into the world.

The first three Sundays of the Season have us focus on the event of the resurrection itself. The disciples not only discover the tomb is empty, but then Jesus appears in their midst in an entirely new way. We hear the different reactions to the event, from doubting Thomas to the two on the road to Emmaus whose eyes were opened. They are grappling with what it all means.

On the Fourth Sunday, there’s a shift. We start to be introduced to Jesus as the Good Shepherd who leads us, inspires us, and moves us to realize he is always here to guide us.

So, on the Fifth Sunday, we hear the comforting words that Jesus never means to abandon us, but instead even has prepared a place for us always to be with him—even death does not end the relationship. A life in Jesus is meant to be lived through him, with him and in him. It’s ongoing.

On the Sixth Sunday of Easter Jesus once again reassures us he won’t leave us as if we are orphans. He sends us an Advocate to make its presence known, who we know as the Holy Spirit. And so, on the Seventh Sunday of Easter, as many dioceses celebrate Jesus’ Ascension into Heaven, his last words are that he will stay with us: “I am with you always, until the end of the age.” And that leads us to the final Sunday of Easter, the great feast of Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit—the way God stays with us to empower us in visible ways to bring His goodness and message to others.

The Easter Season moves us from the awe and wonder of an empty tomb and into the world. Jesus hasn’t gone away from us, but found a way to be as close to us as our own breathing.

That’s why it takes 50 days to celebrate the greatest event of faith known to the human race. It’s the faith we share as Kolping Families throughout the world; the faith we keep alive through our Kolping mission and ideals. We are an “Easter People”, helping to welcome others, take value in our efforts, honor our goodness and help those in need. We are today’s disciples continuing Jesus’ mission of fostering hope in humanity, knowing God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit—is with us every step of the way.


THANK YOU from Alex & Gerhard Schmitt

International Kolping



Kolping empowers women

Kolping enables women worldwide to obtain further skills and earn a living by providing them with training and microcredits. Kolping helps women to lead a life in dignity through “empowerment”: education, training, support to become self-sufficient. For Vilma Limanchi from Bolivia, life has taken a turn for the better – thanks to Kolping:

Vilma Limanchi is 46 years old and a single mother of four children. The eldest has moved out and started her own family. With her three younger children, Vilma lives in a 30-square-metre two-room flat that cannot be heated despite the cold temperatures in the Bolivian city of Potosí, which is located at an altitude of over 4,000 metres. They share one bathroom with other families living in the apartment building.

Although her living conditions are extremely hard, Vilma manages to send all her children to university. This is possible only because of the help she receives from Kolping. Vilma has been a Kolping member for 15 years. In workshops run by her local Kolping Family she learned something that will give her children a chance for a better future: She makes tablecloths, placemats and

pillows that match the season. To do this, she has set up a tiny workshop in her tiny kitchen. A fabric cover – homemade, of course – protects her most precious possession: a sewing machine. She was able to buy it with a microcredit granted by Kolping. Once a year, she also borrows around 700 euros from Kolping to buy a year’s supply of fabrics, paints and brushes in the capital La Paz.

At sales fairs organized by Kolping, she was able to make her products known and build up a customer base. She is particularly busy in the run-up to Christmas and she is glad that her teacher has new designs ready every year in the workshops. On average, she earns the equivalent of 250 euros a month. This is not a high income even in Bolivia, but because she lives frugally and plans well, her children do not have to work, but can study. “This would not be possible without Kolping’s support. If I hadn’t learned this trade there, I would have had to clean or do the laundry for other people. Then my children would have had to leave school a long time ago to help make a living. Kolping is the opportunity of a lifetime and gives my whole family the chance to develop further.”



India: Kolping Cares – Helping the needy

In southern India, cyclone Mandous brought heavy rains and floods in December. Many people suffered hardship, including Narikuravar and Irular people in Tamil Nadu who have been supported by KOLPING India for some time. The two indigenous communities belong to the lowest, strongly discriminated class of Indian society and live in extremely poor conditions.

After the heavy cyclone, KOLPING India launched a relief operation and provided around 250 Narikuravar and Irular families with rice, lentils, blankets, sleeping mats and mosquito nets. This was financed from the disaster relief fund of KOLPING INTERNATIONAL. Since extreme climate events have been increasing in Asia, KOLPING India has been providing more and more humanitarian aid as part of its “Kolping Cares” emergency programme.

Even during the lockdown, which lasted for several months, KOLPING India supported the suffering population with meals and used donations to help people financially during the pandemic in 2020 and 2021.



Focus on project

WOMEN ARE TAKING THEIR LIVES INTO THEIR HANDS

It is never easy for women to take a step towards greater self-confidence – especially in a society that is usually dominated by men. Sometimes a small financial start-up is all women need to free themselves from dependencies.

A woman's place in Bolivia is traditionally in the home and with the children. However, when they are supported to become independent, it not only benefits them but also the family. Kolping offers women courses for empowerment, support and exchange with other women – the start to a better future. Men are also included in family programmes. They are an important part of the change process. Thus strengthened, many women take the next step: they develop ideas on how to use their talents and create an additional income for their family. Small loans as start-up support make it possible. Bakeries, sewing workshops or vegetable gardens are established. In addition to their own savings, they can receive a small loan of 300 euros to fund a professional baking oven. For the tailor, a loan of 200 euros is often enough to secure a supply of fabric for half a year.

A small loan changes the lives of women and their families for the better. Please help with your donation! Even 120 Euros is an important addition to a small loan that enables a woman to have an income of her own.
