San Francisco Kolping turns 100!



It's incredible to think that our Kolping Family is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year! Did you know that the roots of the San Francisco Kolping go back even further, to 1887?

Like many early German societies, the original San Francisco Kolping began as a musical and theatrical club called the Musikalischer Dramatischer Kolping Verein. During those times—before phones, radio, or the internet—Germans loved to sing, perform skits, and gather for theater. Sadly, that group disbanded around the turn of the century.

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, St. Boniface Church served as the heart of the German Catholic community in San Francisco. Many Catholic societies were formed through parish-based clubs, and in 1925, a group of men from St. Boniface revived the Kolping Society in San Francisco, holding its first meeting on July 25, 1925.

The Kolping Society was established with a mission to support young journeymen and apprentices, helping them find stability as they ventured to new cities and countries for work. Its purpose, "to promote the development of individuals and families through spiritual, educational, charitable, and social activities," was vital for the many young men immigrating to the United States during that era (as it is now.)

To assist these newcomers, the Society purchased a large Victorian building at the corner of Oak and Fillmore, transforming it into a boarding house. As demand for rooms grew, they expanded, adding an annex, a social hall, and parking on adjoining lots to accommodate

approximately 35 residents. Remarkably, the Society paid off all mortgages within 20 years, becoming debt-free. For many of our members, this Kolping House was the first place their fathers called home in the U.S.

In 1957, the property was sold to fund plans for a larger community center, but those plans never materialized. Instead, in 1970, the Kolping Society purchased our current hall on Taraval Street, which has been our home ever since.

We are very proud our history and the enduring values of Father Kolping. It's unbelievable sometimes to know that throughout a century of change, transition, and sometimes upheaval, how the principles of family, community, education, work, and spirituality have stood the test of time.

Happy 100th to the San Francisco Kolping Society!
